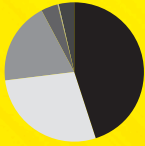

# FEMALE PROGRAMMING

Through the Girl Power groups, 100's of females are served each year. Girl Power groups are facilitated in the Detention Home, local schools, group homes, summer camps, shelters, and individually through referrals from partnering agencies. These groups assist females in making healthy and empowering choices concerning education, sexual health and relationships.

# FAMILY TREATMENT COURT

SERVED

Family Treatment Court facilitates the reunification of children and parents by providing parents opportunities to obtain skills to maintain sobriety, stay employed, develop independence and sustain financial stability. With funding from the George Kaiser Family Foundation, the treatment court was able to implement additional case management services to the clients served.

# INTENSIVE SUPERVISION PROGRAM

The ISP team served 188 youth this fiscal year. Without the ISP program, these youth would have been in and/or spent more time in detention.

CHINS serves youth who have not yet been arrested, but behaviors put them at risk of further involvement with the justice system. Some of the services provided include: community based referrals and Pick Up Orders (for runaway youth).

# PHOENIX RISING

Phoenix Rising Alternative School serves students in Tulsa County, grades 9-12, who are involved with, or are at high risk, for involvement with the juvenile justice system.

# MENTAL HEALTH AND PSYCHOLOGICAL SERVICES

The Mental Health & Psychological Services Team provides vital therapeutic services to youth and families served across the entire organization in order to ensure that youth have access to mental health counseling, therapeutic and educational groups, crisis intervention services, and case management.

Additionally, our team provides psychological evaluation services and guidance for FCJJ staff regarding treatment recommendations. Generous funding from the George Kaiser Family Foundation has continued to support the growth of the Mental Health Evaluation Team (MHET) program, which identifies imperative mental health needs of youth and connects families to specialized treatment services.
