MENTAL HEALTH JAIL DIVERSION

Offenders identified by mental health specialists. Qualified offenders are referred to Family & Children's Services Jail Staff. Program is initiated to establish mental health treatment. Offender is referred to appropriate court for release. The offender is monitored through the court system from release through formal case disposition.

COMMUNITY SERVICE PROGRAM

Community Service hours are assigned by the courts as a part of a defendant's sentence in lieu of incarceration. Defendants are assigned to perform their community service at county work sites or approved non-profit agencies. Documentation of the completion of the community service requirement is reported to the court.

COMMUNITY SERVICE WORK CREW

Under the direct supervision of Tulsa
County Court Services, Community
Service Crews are utilized to assist all 3
of the Tulsa County Highway Districts, the
Levee District in Sand Springs, and various
special projects through the county. The
work performed is necessary for the safety
and beautification of the county. While
performing community service, our clients
are satisfying their court ordered community
service requirement and supplementing the
county work force.
